Wax Crayon Underpants Painting

Science Experiment

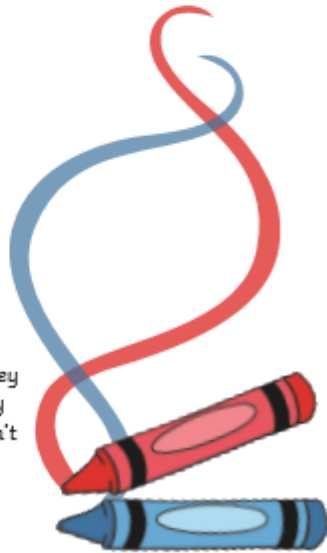


Method

1. Begin by encouraging the children to draw a picture, shape or pattern onto a Large Underpants Template, using a white wax crayon. Encourage them to press quite hard with the crayon (it is easiest to use chunky crayons for this activity).
2. Talk about what the children notice. Can they see their drawing?
3. Explain that it is difficult to see because the crayon and the paper are the same colour.
4. Tell the children that they can now do some magic painting, to make their drawing appear!
5. Ask the children to choose a colour of paint and add lots of water so that the paint is very thin and watery.
6. Allow the children to paint over the top of their pictures.
7. Encourage them to talk about what they can see. Their picture will be magically revealed because the watery paint won't stick to the wax from the crayon.

You will need:

Large Underpants Template
White wax crayons
Watery paint
Paint brushes



Flying Alien

Science Experiment



Method

1. Draw an alien face on the balloons, using the marker pen.
2. Blow up the balloons but do not tie them.
3. Using the sticky tape, attach some toilet roll to the slimmer end of the balloon to make a tail.
4. Let go of the balloon and watch your alien whizz around the room!

You will need:

Green balloons
Marker pen
Toilet roll
Sticky tape



Rock Cakes

Ingredients

225g self-raising flour
75g caster sugar
1 tsp baking powder
125g unsalted butter, cubed
150g dried fruit
2 tsp vanilla extract
1 free-range egg
1 tbsp milk

Equipment

Baking Tray
Greaseproof paper
2 bowls
Wooden spoon
Dessert spoon
Cooling Rack

Method

1. Preheat oven to 180C and line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.
2. In a bowl, mix the flour, sugar and baking powder together.
3. Rub in the cubed butter between your fingers and thumbs until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs. Next, stir in the dried fruit.
4. In a clean bowl, add the vanilla extract, egg and milk and beat with the wooden spoon until mixed well.
5. Add the dry ingredients to the egg mixture and mix together carefully. It should soon become a lumpy, combined mixture. If the mixture does not come together and is still too dry, add a little more milk.
6. Place a spoonful of the mixture onto the prepared baking tray. Make sure there is enough space for the mixture to double in size during cooking.
7. Bake for approximately 15-18 minutes. The cakes should be a lovely, golden brown colour. Remove from the oven and cool slightly before placing on a cooling rack to cool completely.
